


This year's Board of Education has worked hard to plan and complete the new schools and the Junior High addition in District 224.

We hope that the teams to play in Galva's basketball gym in future years may win more Blackhawk Championships.

All in all the play was a huge success, and the entire cast and Miss Davis, their director, rightfully deserved the many compliments they received.









The Parade was high-lighted by the Band and Junior Band and the King and Queen riding





Everyone enjoyed the homecoming this year and we congratulate the Junior class and "G"


















A DAY AT SCHOOL





Compliments are certainly due to the cooks and all the others who worked there.




















On April 22, the annual Blackhawk Conference Band Festival was held here again under the

JUNIOR-SENIOR PROM


The theme for the Junior-Senior Prom this year was "Treasure Island".

At 7:30 the Carnival was officially opened and we all started making noises like barkers












