
The "B" squad, composed mostly of freshmen, had a poor season from the standpoint of winning games, but they improved greatly and next year we hope for a more satisfactory record.








We had our usual trip to the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago on November 1, where the boys enjoyed the exhibits of the newest products of science and industry.



The band felt very fortunate in being able to use the new risers which the Board of Education had recently purchased.




