

When school opened in the fall of 1923, members of the Senior class requested of Superintendent F. U. White that permission be granted to organize for the publication of an annual. He brought the matter before the school board and before a committee of the faculty. Their reactions were favorable and a staff was selected. A contest to name the annual was held. It was won by Miss Gertrude Biedermann, one of the English teachers.

Enthusiasm ran high. Everyone concerned worked hard. We had to work hard because none of us knew much about the publication of a yearbook. Our advisors had to work as hard as the staff members. The engravings for the Galahi were made by a professional firm but the school board insisted that the Galva News handle the printing. The News was not well equipped for such a project but cooperated manfully. The results of all our efforts were quite good. I thought so then and I still do.

In 1853, William L. and James Wiley offered to plant a town on the present site of Galva if the Burlington Road, then building, would erect a station. The agreement was made and the first house and first store were built in 1854. The next year a one-room school was started. This one-room school was soon outgrown, as were subsequent buildings. The Galva High School of 1924 was erected in 1894 at a cost of \$26,607.00. Rapid population growth and the formation of a large school district soon caused the need for more space in the schools. The building which now serves as the Middle School was erected in 1932. The building which now bears the name of Galva High School was completed at a cost of \$1,118,770.58. Classes began in the new building in January, 1968.





Bits Of News From The Past

Oct. 10,1923 - Clifford Sweat had to stay after school for writing on a girl's back. Mar. 14,1924 - Prohibition of snowball throwing. 6,1924 - Gum chewers are barred from school. Hereafter, all students must leave their gum wads on the bedpost. Feb. 16,1925 - Boys discuss how to make their hair nice and slick. Jan. 27,1926 - Mr. Mills gives a lecture on the disadvantages of smoking corn silks. Nov. 3,1927 - First snowfall - Swimming season closes. Jan. 14,1927 - Two freshies fall in the mud - from green to black! Nov. 16,1928 - We defeat Wethersfield 12 - 0 in a field of mud. 1929 - Keith Robinson, freshman, plays first team basketball. Nov. 17.1928 - Teachers Institute in Champaign. Mar. 22,1929 - Official opening of marble season. 5,1929 - Kewanee beats us and how! Jan. 20,1930 - Mumps are quite popular. Mar. 3,1930 - Chemistry class makes chlorin, bromin and other poisonous gases. Feb. 16,1931 - Janitor sweeps up sliced fruit jar rubbers. Apr. 10,1931 - Much disputation about school opening at 8:30 A.M. 1932 - Richard Freece Memorial established. 1933 - First class graduates from the new high school building. Sept. 14,1933 - The temperature dropped this week from 101° to 64°. Mar. 14,1934 - A.G.G. announces he prefers brunettes. Several girls dye their hair. 8.1934 - Mr. Nickle, concert whistler, teaches students to whistle. Dec. 18,1934 - Mrs. Woods speaks on social hygiene. 1937 - Galahi gets a temporary new name — "The Wildcats Roar." 5,1937 - Galva Girl Scout troop organized. Oct. Mar. 1938 - Students vaccinated; faintings overlooked. 1937 - Helen Johnson typed 22 wpm for 9 minutes without error. 11,1938 - Red pencil boxes containing two pencils, a combination red and blue pencil, a pen holder and point, an eraser, a ruler and two blotters were distributed to the students by the Coca-Cola Company. Miss Murphy, home economics teacher, contracts the mumps. Apr. 19,1938 -275 students and 15 teachers clear the building in 58 seconds during a fire drill. Feb. 28,1939 - At a Roman banquet, guests removed shoes while eating and washed their hands after each course. 1941 - First home economics formal dance. 1941 - the football squad was co-champ of the Blackhawk Conference. 1942 - the basketball squad won the Blackhawk championship. 1941 - Football fans got a sunburn one Friday and got snowed upon the next 1942 - Defense stamps were sold every Thursday to purchase a defense bond. 1942 - Irving Manning and Donovan Hamerstrand exhibited chickens at a poultry show. 1942 - An English class party dared to last until midnight. 1943 - Wayne Chilberg is a protege of Charles Atlas. (class prophecy) 1943 - Wayne Troline and Roger Olson were Freshmen class presidents. 1943 - Enough defense stamps were sold to equip 6 soldiers—\$1,245.70. 1944 - A strip tease in shop class. 1944 - Mary Jane Stewart (Atkinson) willed her raccoon coat to Joan Woods. 1944 - The prom theme was "The Blue Room." 1945 - Gerald Lindholm willed his place in the pool hall to Dale Smith. 1945 - Louis Nelson and Ruth Thomson were homecoming king and queen. 1945 - Miss Davis joins the GHS faculty teaching English and World History. 1947 - Worst ice storm in 20 years—school canceled—no electricity for 1947 - Dean Johnson shows Tom Brennaman the proper way to kiss the old ladies. 1948 - Mr. Young joins the faculty. 1949 - Mr. Heck is the new principal of Galva High School.


