



National FFA week came during February which included a dressup day and a program on agriculture at Middle School given for the eighth grade.


The parent and FFA chapter banquet was held in April and the state convention came in June.

Debbie Anderson Leon Best Award

The "Leon Best Award" is based on scholarship, character, leadership, and citizenship. The Award is given by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Ovitz, Jr. in memory of her father Leon Best, a firm supporter of education and community improvement. The winner, who is chosen by the superintendent, the high school principal, the guidance counselor, two high school faculty members and family representation, will receive a \$500 scholarship.



The "I Dare You Award" is presented by the William H. Danforth Foundation to a senior girl and boy who has exemplified leadership based on healthy physical habits, an alert and ever-growing mind, an outreach of friendship, and constructive social relationships within the home and community, and above all character. The winner receives a certificate and a book.



The ''Richard Freece Award'' was established in 1931 by Mrs. E.L. Yocum in memory of Richard Freece who drowned his junior year in high school. This award is given each year to a senior boy who has shown himself to be the best all-around student in scholarship and has been active in high school activities. He must have a 4.0 average or above by the end of his Sophomore year. The winner receives \$100, a gold key, and his name placed on a plaque in the trophy case.

Barb Sundberg DAR Award

The "DAR Good Citizenship Award" is awarded each year to a senior who exemplifies leadership and citizenship to both the school and the community.











Debbie Anderson Beta Sigma Phi Award

The Beta Sigma Award" is Awarded every year to a senior girl who has attended GHS for 3 years and has a 3.5 average or better. The selection is based on the general financial condition and an evaluation of a questionaire where the student is asked why she wants to attend college, how she's worked in and for her high school and community and what the award would mean to her. The winner is chosen by a committee consisting of the high school principal, a senior citizen, community citizen, and 2 members of the Beta Sigma Phi sorority. The winner who is planning on attending a college, university, or accredited vocational school will receive \$200.



Sandy Warner & Sue Howe PEO English Award

The "PEO English Award" was established in 1956 by the BR Chapter of PEO Sisterhood. This award recognizes the superior work in English by a senior girl who has the highest English grade in all 4 years of high school. The winner receives a \$25 government bond.



Lori Rapp Women's Club Recognition Award

The "Woman's Club Gift of Recognition" emphasizes academic improvement, character, leadership and citizenship. Any student who has attended Galva High School four consecutive years is eligible to apply. The gift is \$100 and the recipient is responsible for reporting to the Woman's Club of Galva personally or by letter.



Ernie Bates Overbaugh Farm Award

The "Overbaugh Equipment Award In Agriculture" was established as a means of recognizing the importance of agriculture in the Galva community. The award is based on a student's contribution to agriculture, leadership, scholarship, and school citizenship. To be eligible a student must have attended Galva High School for at least three years, taken agriculture for at least three years and be currently enrolled in agriculture, maintained a 3.5 average through the third quarter of his last year. If a student meets these requirements, he will receive a grant of \$100.

Debbie Anderson Arion Band Award

The "Arion Award" is voted upon each year by the senior band members. They select the senior whom they fell has contributed the most to the band throughout their four years in high school. The winner receives a medal and a pin.

All the members of the band choose the winners of this award. The "Band Directors Award" is based on points received at contest, in jazz band, and various other areas. If one receives 45 points during his years in band then he receives a litter. 75 points receives a pin, and 95 points receives the directors trophy and his name on a plaque.
